

Ask 'Why?'

Humans are unique in creation in seeking meaning. God has created us with an innate desire to explain things. Children are an excellent example of this feature of human nature. Ask any mother of a 4 year old girl who has to answer an average 390 questions each day! Yet, most of us grow less curious as we grow older.

We live in a society with roots in Christianity. For the most part, there's been synergy between our culture's values and those of Christianity. But the gap between Christian values and society's values is widening. There have been shifts in the fundamental beliefs and worldview of society at large which have resulted in an increasing divergence between values of Christianity and society.

In the past we have not had need to be highly critical of social values. But as these values diverge, the onus is on us to critique our culture, to implement that God-given human inquisitiveness and ask, 'why?'

It's said that you need to ask 'why?' five times to get to the root cause of a problem. It turns out the same principle applies to finding the root cause of a behaviour. If we start with a behaviour we've observed and repeatedly ask 'why?' we will discover the value behind the behaviour, the belief behind the value, and the worldview behind the belief. Everything we do is informed by our worldview, even when we don't consciously realise it.

There are values and beliefs behind every behaviour. It is axiomatic that people with changed attitudes change their own behaviour. When people understand why they're doing something they are much better at regulating their own behaviour. So, if we want to see change, or even if we want to take a relationship to the next level, let's start with asking 'why?' and listen to the answer.

You may find common ground you can build on. You may be able to point out inconsistencies in the beliefs and behaviours of others. You may even change your mind!

Be creative in how you ask 'why?' Sometimes it doesn't even take a question. If you reflect back what you've heard, i.e. "So you think it's good that...?" you will likely get a response that effectively answers the question 'why?'

What other ways can you think of to ask 'why?' without asking 'why?'

It's good to practise on yourself, too. The more you understand your own behaviours, values and beliefs, the more consistent you will be in applying them and the more confident you will be in explaining them to others.

Let's equip ourselves to be confident Christians, sure of our beliefs and able to engage the world, by using our God-given inquisitive nature and ask 'why?'

Wayne, her son, told me that when she was living in Rest Homes, when the residents were feeling sad or depressed, the staff would ask Marj to sing and cheer them up and she would sing worship songs to them. She particularly loved, Jesus Loves Me.

At her service, a wee film was played of Marj in bed singing, taken at the Hospice a couple of days before she died.

She died as she lived, with Praise in her heart.

Fiji Follow Up

In 2016 Chelsea Turner was having a gap year after finishing high school. She was on a school teaching assignment in Uluibau, Moturiki Island, Fiji when Cyclone Winston hit (the most intense tropical cyclone in the Southern Hemisphere currently on record). After experiencing the devastation and suffering, Chelsea couldn't in good conscience come home to NZ and do nothing. She rallied the troops and fundraised a massive \$50,000 in emergency supplies for the village. This project was called Fiji Fix Up. A series of frustrating events occurred and Pastor Charles heard and came in to support the project and help remove obstacles. Through it all, a special bond was formed with Pastor Charles, his wife Tina and the Turner family.

Here we are in 2019 with Fiji Follow Up. A team of ten adults and young people from three churches in Canterbury (including GBC) went to Suva for ten days in Sept/Oct to encourage the local churches, share our faith, and help in practical ways.

A catalyst for this trip was that the solar-powered pump providing water for Uluibau village had failed and needed to be repaired. This was achieved but not without some drama. We thought we had taken all required parts to complete the repair but we had missed one important part: we required a replacement motor. As a last resort the only place we were able to access one was in the neighbouring village Daaku. Because this pump was gifted to them after Cyclone Winston but never installed, asking for it back was not easy. After negotiating we agreed to return with another pump and install it in winter 2020.

Another project was building two storeys beneath Pastor Charles and Tina's house. We were surprised and excited to have another team arrive to help us from Calvary Chapel Bible Institute in Te Awamutu. You can see from the photos it was a very labour-intensive job with a human chain gang to move concrete blocks and mix concrete by hand. This project is still a work in progress.

Before we return with a team in Winter 2020 we are keen to find more support for the following projects:

- Finish building the house (\$5,000)
- Water supply for Daaku (\$5,000)
- Establish a chicken business to support ongoing ministry (\$25,000)
- Tina and Charles' day-to-day living costs

The people of Fiji don't have access to the same material resources that we are blessed with here in NZ. But there is a richness in the way they live together and care for each other. Below are some personal stories and prayer requests:

Pastor Charles & Tina

Live in Suva, Fiji and have 3 children Elizabeth (10), Phillip (4), & Charles (2). Their Ministry is with Word of Life, discipling youth, encouraging, visiting schools and visiting Indians homes. They recently felt called by the Lord to leave their comfortable lives, Charles as Pastor of a local Brethren church, step out and live by faith doing the work they are doing. Please join us to pray for:

- the planting of a 3 month old church based at their home.
- looking after 11 young people.
- 3 young people are currently not living with them, praying they will return home.

Vilimone B

Vilimone is 26 years old. He is disabled on the left side of his body. He was brought up on the island of Moturiki. Pastor Charles and Tina met him when they went to help Chelsea with Cyclone Winston. Vilimone had never been to school, Charles and Tina offered to help him go to school. You can see the light in his eyes. First day in school he came home with tears in his eyes, tears of joy after 24 years in the village. Vilimone is a prayer-warrior, loves to dance, and is faithful in his duties at home and school. Vilimone is now in his second year at school. Please join us in prayer for:

- Vilimone to be able to participate in the NZ Calvary Chapel Youth Conference next year.
- Healing on his left side (while we were there Vilimone received some healing with increased mobility in his left hand - praise the Lord).
- opportunity to compete in Paralympic Games next year in Shot Put and Javelin.

Sanaila Kula

I am 23 years old and deaf, from Levuka (Island behind Moturiki Island). I love rugby and play for the Fiji Deaf Team which is currently fundraising with a car wash business. On 7-9 November we are playing against PNG and Samoa here in Fiji and really looking forward to it. I think Fiji will win. In 7's I play any position and in Rugby I play #10, I kick best with my left foot. I'm grateful to live here with my adopted Mum and Dad (Tina & Charles) for the past 8 years. Because I'm deaf, I'm not sure what the future holds. Please pray for future job opportunities. I would like the opportunity to go to NZ or Australia and pick fruit (especially apples).

Anil

I enjoy living here with Charles & Tina. 3 months ago the 5 toes on my left foot were amputated due to diabetes. I attend the hospital daily for dressing changes. Healing is progressing slowly and the hospital staff predict full healing by the end of 2019. Praise God today I could walk around the house without crutches for the first time. Please pray for quicker healing, for my daily needs, and for financial provision for taxis to and from hospital every day.



With Suresh & Saral Chandra

I was raised in a Hindu family as one of nine children. In 1968 one of my brothers became a Christian then one after another, the whole family gave their hearts to the Lord. I was the last to accept Jesus as my Lord and Saviour. I was enjoying the ways of the world, but one day at church I felt God say to me, Your time is up Suresh, it's time to become a Christian. We were the only family in a village of 200 people to become Christians. The Hindu Worship Centre was next door to our house. To begin with, the village rejected us with our new found faith, but in the end, we were all close friends. I met Saral in Lautoka, Suva. She was a Hindu. When we met, she came to know the Lord and we were married in 1985.

We moved to NZ in 2009, to work in the dairy farm industry. We are blessed with two sons and their wives. One family lives in Temuka and the other in Canada, each with a child.

Trust in the Lord and pray, for God knows the best. I believe the reason I was healed was to testify that nothing is impossible for our God. He does miracles and can turn things around in seconds. I was healed of Lymphoma cancer in 2018. Diagnosed in April 2018 I received 6 chemo treatments and was cleared in September 2018. The family came from all over when I was sick - this lifted us up.

During this period of sickness, my work visa expired. NZ immigration didn't want to renew my visa even though the doctors gave a letter declaring I was clear and there was no sign of cancer. After much prayer, letters to Immigration and help of our MP, at the very last moment, God opened the door for us to receive Permanent Residency in NZ. We glorify God, a miracle-working, wonder-working God.

With Asenaca Siga

I came to know the Lord in 1965, in the town of Vatukoula on the west side of Fiji. A friend took me to church, and the preacher asked if there was someone here who wants to give their heart to the Lord. I was shy and didn't know how I stood up and went up to the altar in the Assembly of God Church. I prayed, repenting of my sin, inviting Jesus into my heart. Three weeks later I was baptised in the Tarua River. From then on after school each Friday I would go to the Indian Villages visiting the Hindus, Punjabs and Muslims giving out Christian tracts. On Saturday I stayed with friends and we attended church together on Sunday, riding on the back of a tractor.

When I returned home, I thought Dad would tell me to leave because I had gone to the Assemblies of God Church with Aunty, but we were a Methodist family. From then on I was not allowed to leave the house. One day Aunty came and took me while Father was at work. He was angry, as it was the duty of the father to protect their daughter's future. This was often done by not letting their daughters leave the house.

I was married in 1974 to Sailasa. My husband was not born again and he liked alcohol very much. But one day he agreed to come to church. After four weeks he went alone to talk to the Pastor and was quietly baptised without the family knowing. Sailasa had a genuine life-changing experience and the family was very happy.

My husband wanted to move to NZ and work as a line mechanic but our application was declined. Then one day when I was at the store buying the Fiji Times newspaper, I met an Australian immigration worker who agreed to support us in our application. After 2 weeks and a \$75 application fee, we were packing our bags and moving to NZ. It was 1989. Our daughter Mela stayed in Suva as a High School teacher, but our son Amimi came to NZ and was the first Fijian to be educated at Timaru Boys High School. He played rugby for the Harlequins.

My husband has passed away and our daughter has since died of cancer. This hit me very hard, but God gave me a special dream of reassurance which has lifted me up out of a pit of despair.

One Sunday at church I heard that there were a few sick people in Timaru hospital. My heart was stirred to pray for my brother Suresh. I was concerned I could lose someone very close. I went home and called Tu Penny and told him our brother Suresh is very sick and I don't want to lose him. Urgently a group of Fijian men went up to the Timaru hospital to pray. In Suresh's room everyone had to wear masks and aprons. It smelt like he was dying; his skin was yellow and people didn't expect he would survive. The men prayed and Suresh was miraculously healed within 3-4 weeks. Praise the Lord!

Greetings Young People and Families!

Welcome to Term 4 of 2019 already! We're really excited about this term.



