

What does it take to be a thriving faith community?

In the early days, Christianity grew in the Roman Empire at a rate of 40 percent a decade, growing from around 1,000 (0.0017 percent of the population) in A.D. 40 to nearly 34 million (56.5 percent of the population) in A.D. 350.¹

The 2018 census tells us that in NZ, 38.6% are Christian and 48.6% hold no religion.¹ The meaning behind these numbers is complex but certainly we would do well to learn from the early Christian communities' experiences. The bible has a lot to teach us about being a thriving faith community. There are 47 'one another' commands given to followers of Jesus,¹ the most repeated one by far is 'love one another'. Not only is 'love one another' good for us as a faith community, but our love for one another is what will make us stand out in the world as followers of Jesus (John 13:34-35).

Some 2020 Focus Areas

Ephesians 6:12. Let's spend time on focusing on healing our family. Jesus is coming back for a bride without spot or wrinkle, a pure clean spotless unblemished and holy bride - not one bound up with hurts and baggage from her past or one bound up in sin and shame - no. He is coming back for a victorious bride. A bride that is ready with her lamp filled and not afraid to shine it in this broken world.
- Creative Worship: To foster and develop creative worshipping for all ages, i.e., use of flags, dance, ribbons and veils during worship in a sensitive and respectful manner
- Outreach: To foster and develop opportunities where our Church family can represent Christ out in the community; i.e., Relay for Life; or in our Church building i.e., Christian Singles Dinner "Come to the Table"; Community Prayer for Healing; Marriage Renewal and Sexuality and Promoting Marriage Talks, Community Debates; Witnesses/Speakers. This is being obedient to Jesus's instructions to heal the sick, cast out demons, set the prisoners free, raise the dead (well, maybe not that so much).
- Teaching: To take advantage of and bring in suitable and approved Christian teachers and leaders to grow and train up our Church family in all areas of ministry.
- Community Trust: we have witnessed the power of church and trust working collaboratively and are keen to model this in our own community. We have a passion to serve and support our community and make a difference. We are a faith led people that believe in the power of social justice coupled with the boundless compassion of Christ-centered love will create a positive life changing movement across South Canterbury.

Ecclesiastes 3:1 King James Version

"To everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven"

With school holidays behind us, summer days are beginning to shorten a wee bit, and the colourful days of autumn lie ahead. Year on year as the seasons change, it seems to me that they reflect God's amazing plan for growth and rest in our lives, for work and holidays, for new opportunities and the laying to rest of past experiences. They're all part of God's timing.

I'd like you tell you about a couple of situations when God's timing was really evident in my life. Some might call it coincidence – maybe another description could be God-incidence.

Leaving Zimbabwe in 2003 was a huge decision for our little family, taken not easily or lightly, but with heavy hearts. Of course we were in some ways compelled to leave, mainly for financial reasons – no-one can cope with hyper-inflation, when your life savings are eroded daily and an empty shoe box is needed to carry round grocery money. At the time, our two older children, Steve and Kate, were ready for tertiary education and we had no way of providing this for them.

New Zealand was beckoning. With some advice from an old friend here who put us in touch with an agent, we submitted our application to immigrate. This was de-railed when the New Zealand government suddenly put up the points needed to enter this country, so something extra was required. The friend had taught with us at our school in Zim for a couple of years – many years previously – and of course was known by us all as "Kiwi". Fortunately, Kiwi was in a position to offer Gareth a job here at the International Language School in Timaru. A job offer would then give us enough points to qualify for entry. So our application winged its way to Wellington once more – and many of you perhaps aren't aware of some of the hurdles legal immigrants face – police clearances which expire in three months, medical tests and X-rays which expire in six months, the need to prove we and our kids are English-speaking, references from previous employers, including some in England and so on. Because I held an Irish passport I even had to have Police clearance from Ireland, a country I have never lived in! Getting everything in order takes time and also takes a toll emotionally as you realise that you're burning bridges. While the future is exciting, you're also having to leave behind people and places that have been the fabric of your life since birth.

So the waiting began. We roughly planned that Gareth would come on alone while I went to South Africa with Suzie to spend a few weeks with my parents who had retired there. Gareth was quite anxious about it all, not knowing what he would meet on arrival – would he be allowed in on his word of a prospective job? Would he simply be given a holiday visa? Would we have to leave Zealand again after a year? We were making plans very much in the unknown, all the while selling household effects, a plot of land, and finding homes for our pets. Finally, pressure was put on Gareth by our patient friend, Kiwi, to get here by a definite date, the 6th of September. It had been almost two years since the start of the process, and he, understandably, was not willing to wait much longer. He advised us to come over anyway and carry on with the paperwork here. But Gareth is a details sort of guy, and we had heard stories of people who landed here only to be turned away on arrival, or given a few months to stay before having to leave again and await further paperwork. We simply didn't have the money – or the stamina – for this.

We booked flights in apprehension, paying with precious foreign currency.

On the night of 5 September, our little family was gathered in Harare in a rented room. Gareth was packed and ready to leave for an evening flight, excited but still concerned about the possibility of not being accepted permanently into New Zealand. We shared a meal and a prayer together, our apprehension mixed with trust in God's faithfulness.

Guess what happened?

One hour before leaving for the airport, we got a phone call from Kiwi to say that he had heard from the agent, and our application for full Permanent Residence in New Zealand had been accepted! Coincidence? Again, prefer to call it God-incidence! Our trust in God was surely rewarded.

My other story is much simpler. On arrival in Timaru late in 2003, I needed to find a teaching job. I visited all the local schools, and was surprised and disappointed at how little French was taught here. So I had to dig up some ancient secretarial and administrative skills, and look elsewhere for employment. I had heard about this huge milk processing factory outside Timaru, so one day I turned up on the doorstep of the white and blue factory out at Clandeboye and asked to see the personnel manager. He gave me about a minute of his time, saying that you never get a job with Fonterra like that – he told me to look in the paper or apply online. Well, at that point the words "online" and 'internet' didn't form part of my vocabulary so I scanned the newspapers and sure enough within just a week or two, there was a position for something called an Order to Delivery Officer. I applied for and got the job. It entailed sending hundreds and thousands of tonnes of milk powder to China!! Talk about a new season in my life!! Of course I didn't realise at the time how fortunate I was to pick up a reasonably-paid position out at Clandeboye, and I set about learning new skills in an industry I had never given a thought to before. The job was initially for six months. This was extended twice more. Finally we were informed that all Order to Delivery positions throughout the country would move to Auckland to the new Fonterra Customer Services Centre there. My workmates and I had a final six months to train others and to hand over our files, finishing off at the end of January 2006.

Again, Guess what? God knew my needs and intervened once more, with his incredible timing: Five days later, I began teaching French at Roncalli in the first week of February 2006. French-teaching posts in small towns are, like hens' teeth, difficult to find (and sadly, are likely to disappear altogether some day!!) – so once again, I found myself, a recent immigrant, in the fortunate position of being employed, and even better, doing what I love!!

Coincidence? God-incidence? In retrospect, God's timing was perfect. Because I had not found a teaching post immediately, I had a two-year buffer, allowing me to make contact with local language teachers and get some understanding of the complex school system before becoming engulfed in it!! God showed me that he knows best – for I would never have planned that, and yet it was certainly what I needed.

Can you see God's hand and his incredible timing in these personal stories?

Like the Old Testament Israelites who were finally freed from slavery in Egypt after years and years of waiting for God to fulfil his promise to Abraham to bring his descendants back into Canaan, I believe that these things don't just happen. In Exodus Chap 3, we're told of the plight of the Israelites – "*Looking down upon them, he knew that the time had come for their rescue*". I think God rescued my family in the situations I've just described, but in **his** time, not ours.

So too, King David wrote in Psalm 31 "*You are my God. My times are in your hands.*"

As we enjoy the last days of summer, let's acknowledge God's amazing timing in our lives, never too early, never too late. We recognize that our lives have seasons – ups and downs, beginnings and endings, new opportunities and farewells, celebrations and sad times..... and always God, the great Time Keeper, is in control.

Close Up

With Kathryn Richmond

Born in Dunedin and raised in a Christian family attending a small Anglican Parish Church. Shifted to Timaru at age of 10. Always had a feeling that my parents didn't settle well in Timaru. Attended St Mary's church and Sunday School. At age 14 my mother died suddenly from a brain haemorrhage at age of 52. I remember my father being devastated as he wanted to keep us together. I became a rather 'wayward' teenager and my father was a very gentle caring man, and I became pretty much a free agent.

Had two elder brothers so I was pretty much 'Dad's little girl.'

At the age of 16 I became pregnant and had a boy who was adopted out. Though I was in a relationship with the father we were too young at the time to bring up a baby. I was still at school, and we felt adoption was the best action at the time. When I was 17 my father had a massive heart attack and died suddenly at the age of 62. I was still in a relationship with the father of baby boy at the time. We did end up marrying when I was 19. Had two wonderful daughters and remained married for 24 years. At this time my husband left me for another woman, who was supposedly a friend of ours! We were married at St Mary's church in Timaru, but I had drifted away from my Christian upbringing.

While I was married, I was invited by a friend to a Woman's fellowship group, which led me to Gleniti Baptist Church and I became a born again Christian and was baptized again. While I was married and after the birth of my daughters I was diagnosed with Cervical cancer at Stage III. I felt God was telling me to seek medical advice and then underwent two separate surgeries. I had good Christian friends praying with me and did feel the Lord being with me at this time. This was most probably a major turning point in my life when I gave my heart to the Lord. I definitely felt the Lord's presence during my marriage breakup as I was devastated. My Heavenly Father gave me the strength to carry on and be there for my daughters at that difficult time.

The Lord moves in wonderful ways. I have met our adopted son and his family and now count them among my best friends. A true blessing in itself. They have included us a family as he is a full brother to my daughters. All children now married with a son and daughter each. I thank the Lord for this blessing. It was also a blessing to his adoptive parents as they had tried for years to start a family. Since then went on to have a daughter. I remember them thanking us for the "most precious gift anyone could give". They gave him so much more than we could have as teenage parents.

I did move on and remarry, and although we were happy to begin with, he was not a Christian and things did not work out. After 11 years together I found his non acceptance of my girls unacceptable, along with other difficult situations. This time it was my turn to leave a marriage which was very stressful. My girls have been very supportive, as well as their amazing husbands. Throughout everything I have felt the Lord's presence. Several verses have been helpful on my journey.

Philippians 4:13

"I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me."

James 4:8

"Draw near to God and he will draw near to you."

Philippians 4:6-7

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

Matthew 6:34

"Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own."

Also, **Jeremiah 29:11** has been a good verse to give strength.

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."
